Bumblebee students were able to choose their new topic for the New Year and after much debate the class chose to learn about Plants. We have been growing our own plants from seeds in cotton wool and also seeing if we can grow roots from cuttings taken around the playground. The students have been practising their drawing skills and learning to match colours and shapes to real objects and try to represent them on paper when drawing.

Our favourite story at the moment is "Jack and the Beanstalk". This then inspired them to compare big and small objects and begin sequencing work.

## RECEPTION LIONS BLAST OFF!

5, 4, 3, 2, 1! We have BLAST OFF with the Reception Lions embarking on an interstellar mission to explore and learn about space.

The children have become little astronauts discovering interesting facts about space through songs, rhymes and books. The Lions have looked at a wide range of books including some fiction and non-fiction and have even made their own books on stars. It has been great to see that our Lions are becoming more and more independent in their writing.

The children were really amazed to find out that stars are not truly stars but are actually suns. They also discovered that the stars make patterns in the sky and have enjoyed making their own constellations by shining a torch through cards that they had made holes in and seeing their constellations glimmering against a dark wall.

There was also much excitement in the Lion classroom when we made paper and balloon rockets. There were balloon powered rockets flying in all directions, some in straight lines as they whizzed along a wire and others circled and spun around the room. The children were able to identify that the air trapped inside the balloons acted as the rocket's engine and made them fly through the air. It was great fun for everyone.

## Year 1 NEWS

Year 1 started a new topic, Food from Plants, by finding out about rice and how it is grown in Thailand.

They looked at real rice plants and grains of rice from the plants to compare them to cooked and uncooked rice, and learned how other cereals are grown to provide us with food such as wheat and oats. When they compared old and new methods of growing crops, they understood that modern machines make it much easier.

Then the class learned how fruits and vegetables grow and how to distinguish fruits from vegetables. They investigated a variety of fruit to find the seeds: the banana was a bit tricky! Then they looked at some vegetables and found out which parts we eat – leaves, roots or stalks.

Next they put mung beans on wet tissue paper and are now waiting and watching to see how they grow. They are drawing accurate pictures and writing to record their observations.

English lessons have linked to the topic through the stories 'The Little Red Hen', 'Oliver's Vegetables' and 'Jack and the Beanstalk'. The children explore the characters in the stories by taking on the role of a character and the others ask questions. Each time they think of harder questions and the answers are sometimes quite imaginative. They have started to make story maps which help them to sequence the events in a story.

Place value has been the focus in maths, so that the children understand that the digits represent tens or ones. They also weighed objects using a variety of materials, such as cubes, beads and pegs, to find which was the heaviest. They also weighed out some ingredients on a set of scales when they baked oat raisin cookies.

After tasting six different breakfast cereals, the children decided which one they liked most. Then they collected this information by recording it in a chart and displayed it in the form of a block graph. From this it was easy to see that Honey Stars was the most popular.

## Year 2 NEWS

Year 2 started the new term with a wonderful new classroom. As our topic this term is Thailand, the children were amazed to see that Year 2 had their very own Thai rainforest. The children all love our new classroom and we are looking forward to the terms ahead - what an amazing way to start 2014!!

Since the last Newsletter, Year 2 children have worked consistently hard and have produced some wonderful work as a result.

In English the children have been learning to read and create poems. The children have been focusing on learning and reciting poems with confidence, recognising and comparing patterns and rhyme with poems.

In maths the children have been learning to recognise, name and describe 3D shapes. The children focused on learning how we use 2 and 3D shapes in our everyday environment. The children loved going on a shape hunt around school with their I pads to photograph and display 2 and 3D shapes in our school.

ICT lessons have focused on experimenting with CD Roms and the amount of information contained on them. The children have been searching information using the menu options and have also been searching through the use of key words. In addition to experimenting with CD Roms, the children have been using ICT to research information and to present their work.

Science lessons have involved learning about forces of moving vehicles. The children understand that forces can make something stop, speed up or down and that pushes and pulls can change the shape of an object. The children carried out tests with different vehicles to accurately predict what would happen.

Topic lessons have focused on Seaside Holidays. The children have been considering the differences between islands and the mainland, comparing Bangkok to seaside locations and discussing similarities and differences between holidays now and those 'long ago'.

### Trips

As you will know, Years 4, 5 and 6 were recently on residential trips either in Khao Yai National Park or in Chiang Mai. These trips were a huge success, were very well organised, and were not only great learning experiences, but were great fun too. I'd like to thank all the children for being so well-behaved and for their hard work, and all the staff for helping them run so smoothly.

### Here are some comments made by the Year 4 children about their Khao Yai trip:

**Jazzy-** 'I liked it because it was really cold. I learned that at night bats use echoes. So if there is a wall in front of a bat, the echo bounces back to the bat, and the bat knows the wall is there.'

**Jamie-** 'I liked the bunk beds. I liked to go on the dangerous old bridge. It was wobbly.'

**Sang Sang –** 'I liked the night safari when we looked at the animals at night time. I liked when I went hiking in another group (Mr Chris' group) and then he showed us how to walk through the bridge. The food was so yummy! In the morning we got cocoa!'

**Topfy-** 'I liked it when we searched for water bugs. I also liked hiking.'

**Jai-** 'I liked the cold weather and the hiking. Because the hiking was fun and I wasn't that tired.'

## Year 3 NEWS

We are having a very busy half-term, but also a very productive one.

In literacy we have been looking at humorous poetry. The children have practised reading poems with the correct intonation and expression, looked at how different poems are structured, and have learnt powerful verbs and adverbs. We have also learnt about onomatopoeia and spoonerisms, and used these to write our own funny poem. Our next Literacy topic will be non-chronological reports.

Our maths focus so far has been on calculation, and in particular, written methods of division. We have also been problem solving using logical reasoning. Our next focus is fractions, which is always a fun one to teach!

In science, our topic is solids and liquids. The children are learning to recognise differences between solids, liquids (and gases) in terms of ease of flow and maintenance of shape and volume; the causes and effects of melting and freezing; that some solids dissolve in water, and others do not, and that undissolved solids can be separated from liquids by filtration.

In ICT we are continuing to learn to combine text and graphics using Microsoft Word and Publisher, and our cross-curricular art and design and geography topic is Volcanoes. We are studying how volcanoes are formed, where they are found, what the inside of a volcano looks like, and what happens after an eruption. The topic will finish with the writing a report about everything they have found out, and making their own erupting volcano!

Finally, I would like to express my thanks to all the parents for helping the children create such high quality holiday homework projects. The project based homework is designed to help us work together to drive the children's learning forward. Children should be given choices about the way in which they learn, and to also follow their interests, and these projects reflect that ethos. So far, it has been a tremendous success, and long may it continue. I have included a few pictures of some of the great pieces of work that came back after the New Year break.

## Year 4 NEWS

The Year 4 class welcomed in the New Year with exciting, new subject matter to study and explore! They also enjoyed a fantastic residential trip to Khao Yai! They hiked through jungle trails and engaged in environmental studies. The students returned with exciting stories of fun, laughter and pertinent learning experiences.

For Literacy lessons, we have begun our work on poetry and poem writing. With extended review of grammatical fundamentals, we've started analyzing and composing our own poetry. The results will be posted outside our room soon!

In maths, we've continued our multiplication exercises and promptly dived into division. After becoming more familiar with remainders, we started looking at the true values of decimals. Turning those decimal denominations into fractions is proving to be quite tricky.

Our work in DT/Art has brought us to a higher level of drawing capability. We've learned some of the secrets to uniform sketching. Our final creations include portraits of classmates, erupting volcanoes and city skylines!

We've enjoyed great challenges in our science classes as we investigate the properties of solids and liquids. While the theme of 'matter' is daunting, we've done our research in a very hands-on approach. Discussing volume, capacity and mass, we weighed and measured different types of matter. We've also tested the viscosity of liquids, such as ketchup, honey and cooking oil. Wow, messy but fascinating work!

Volcanoes and earthquakes have heightened our curiosity in Topic class. An inquiry into the mechanics of volcanoes and earthquakes requires an understanding of the Earth's structure. Learning about plate tectonics, the "Ring of Fire" and the Earth's layers has been thought-provoking work. Our big finale will be working models of volcanoes, accompanied by spectacles of lava flow!

Term two is off to a wonderful start and the students are really enjoying being back at school after a long break. I'd like to give a big welcome to Patrick and Jom, both of whom are boarders and are off to a great start here at Bromsgrove. We had a fantastic trip to Khao Yai for our residential. The students and teachers had a lot of fun. We also learned a great deal about the different habitats and wildlife of Khao Yai and the importance of environmental conservation and protection.

In literacy we have been focusing on the mystery genre. We have read several short mystery stories and have been working on writing multiple paragraphs, using adverbials, and developing our characters. We will be putting together a class mystery book in the coming week.

Our topics in maths so far this term have been rounding, multi-digit multiplication and division, and fractions. These topics have been quite tricky for the students but they have been working really hard to understand them. The students have really enjoyed the life cycles unit in science this term. We have been growing our own plants in class and learning about the life cycles of plants and animals. Furthermore, we have been identifying the parts of plants and flowers and discussing their roles in the reproduction process.

In history the students have been discovering the ancient civilization of Egypt. They are really enjoying this unit and have been learning a great deal about the Pharaohs, architecture, burials, life style, and culture of Ancient Egypt. We have also been doing hands-on arts and crafts, including making King Tutankhamun masks, writing hieroglyphic stories, and creating our own pyramids.

Finally, in ICT the students have been getting reinforcement in all the subject areas through the website Zondle.com. The students have also been creating their own quizzes from what we have learned in class on this website. The students will also be doing a research project in ICT, which is linked to the history unit on Ancient Egypt.

## YEAR 6 NEWS

Year 6 all started term 2 with lots of excitement. Our residential was coming very soon. 3 nights in Chiang Mai investigating the Hill tribes of Thailand complete with 1 night staying in a traditional Karen hill tribe house.

Visiting our first hill tribe, the Hmong people, we experienced traditional hemp weaving skills. Traditional spinning top toys, precision shooting of cross bows and time for a little handicraft shopping were our pastimes before we rejoined our drivers in time for our journey to the Premtinsulanonda International School and the 'bunkhouse' which was to be our home for the next 2 nights.



Our dinner that night was a traditional khantok meal of Northern Thai food shared around a small round table. Our entertainment was a fast moving display of Thai Northern style dancing, swordsmanship and music, all performed in the amphitheatre. The chilly temperatures and clear moon was a perfect scenesetter for our final activity of the night; sending firework festooned lanterns up into the sky.

The school organic farm was the next destination for the following days activities. Preparation and cooking of our lunch, again of Chiang Mai fare, was our activity for the day. Grilled chicken and pork, chilli dip, omelettes cooked in banana leaf boats, grilled vegetables and sticky rice were all on the menu and we all enjoyed cooking and eating the delicious food.

The next day saw us travelling high up Doi Inthanon to the highest point in Thailand. We all reached for our spare jumpers and jackets as the temperature dropped noticeably.

Our coffee producing hosts, living in traditional stilted houses, were there to greet us as we arrived. Very far from our comfort zone, Year 6 children experienced life in a Karen village first hand. Many of us, cold and dreaming of our beds back in Bangkok, packed our things and headed back down to the 'bunk house' and later our flight back to Bangkok. A memorable trip for us all.

Back at school, Year 6 have used their adventure to learn many things linked to the curriculum, especially in geography where the study of the hill tribes of Thailand has been our focus.

Emotive and 'green' poetry has been the topic in English. Features of poetry has been our topic, and we have been learning how we can use the language to make our poetry more effective and have a greater impact.

Science continues to be exciting this term with further visits to the secondary lab to do our experiments, which this half term have been all linked to dissolving, evaporation and filtration.

Maths - Data handling, fractions, measures, mean, median and mode are just a small selection of the topics year 6 children have been covering in Maths.

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
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
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
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
